State's oldest bank purchases FSB

Ownership of First State Bank will change for the first time in 58 years following the purchase of the bank by First Northern Bank of Wyoming, the oldest bank in Wyoming, according to an Aug. 2 joint press release from both banks.

Initially, there will be no changes for customers and the bank will continue to operate under different ownership, said Darwin Rabenberg, president and chief executive officer at First State Bank. Down the road,

Check fraud strikes city

The city of Newcastle is closing one of its accounts at First State Bank after a series of fraudulent checks were written on the account. According to City Clerk-Treasurer Stacy Haggerty, the checks totaled \$12,046.01. but the alleged perpetrator was caught and the

money will be returned. "I was notified by the bank that we had some fraudulent checks go through the bank," Haggerty told the Newcastle City Council on Aug. 2.

Through the diligence of the receiving bank, an unnamed bank in South Carolina, Haggerty said the check writer was caught and the money would be put back in the city's account.

"The bank is taking care of that. They have recommended that we close that account," she said.

The council voted to close the account and

Dunking into the pro level

Newcastle High School graduate Lenora Sundstrom might be a familiar name to local basketball fans because she lit up the scoreboard in the Dogie Dome throughout her high school career. Now living in Australia and still active in hoops, Sundstrom recently reached a pinnacle in her career when she was selected to be a statistician at the 2022 FIBA

Women's Basketball World Cup. The event will be held from Sept. 22 to Oct. 1 at the Sydney Olympic Park in Sydney, Australia.

"I'm really looking forward to being a part of basketball at such a high level. I've never actually seen the women's national team play, so I'm extremely excited to see the U.S. team play and the Australian team play," Sundstrom said.

Being a statistician, she said, is a very technical role that requires a minimum of two

people — referred to as a caller and an inputter. The caller closely watches everything that happens on the court and tells the inputter what to enter, using "specific language and detailed definitions of actions," she said.

At the national or international levels, a three-or-fourperson crew is used for further validation. A spotter verifies both the calls and the inputted information, and sometimes a backup inputter is needed. A statistician must know how to perform all three duties.

"Statistics is a totally different side of the game, but at the elite level, it is incredibly important to get it right. Often, we are making splitsecond decisions on a call that feeds back vital information to coaches in real time, but also supports long-term player and












At that time, Hadlock emailed the updated results that showed Taylor had received more votes than Huber. The official results from the election show Huber received 1,074 votes while Taylor received 1,077.

In a follow-up discussion with Hadlock on Aug. 20, Hadlock informed the paper that one of the necessary boxes was not checked before the unofficial results were compiled, leaving out a portion of the votes. Once the mistake was caught, she checked the box and reprinted the results.

Weston County Republican Party Chairman Kari Drost asked the commissioners on Aug. 2, 2022, during the public comment period of their meeting, whether steps had been taken to ensure that the results released on election day are accurate, in hopes of avoiding calling the race for the wrong candidate again. She noted that election integrity is as well as one of its platform planks.

"Therefore, the party has put lots of time, energy and resources into making sure our elections in Wyoming are free and fair, and that the people feel confident in our election results," Drost said, "And, as you can see from the state and national events, movies, articles, etc. that the people have made this issue a priority as well. Personally, I want people to feel confident in election results and, most importantly, in our Weston County election results."

In response, Hadlock assured Drost and others in attendance that everything was "good to go." She noted that what happened during the 2020 primary election was the mistake of an individual and that it would not happen again.

> When asked about which specific steps had been taken, Hadlock said that all the tests had been run and sent to the secretary of state. No other specifics were given.

Drost acknowledged that she had attended the "very informative" public meeting held by Hadlock to test the voting machines on July 29.

"I learned a lot, and the meeting was very well attended. Clearly, this shows that the people of Weston County are concerned and engaged, and I thank Clerk Hadlock and her staff for taking the time to show the public what procedures are in place in Weston County," Drost said.

Drost later told the News Letter Journal that she was excited to see the people of Weston County holding offinumber of people showed up to view the testing and signed up to be poll watchers.

Poll watchers, she noted, are the first line of defense in a free and fair election. Drost explained that they are a part of a coordinated system to quickly detect, mitigate, and document unintentional and intentional election-related disruptions that arise during registration, voting and counting periods. The goal is to ensure a fair and open process where everyone who is legally entitled to vote has the opportunity to cast their one ballot and have it counted properly.

"I am very confident that the peoples' voices will be heard this election season. The people want an open and transparent government that is accountable to We the People," Drost said. "I pray that that is exactly what we will get."

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Justice Harlan's imperishable dissent in Plessy v. Ferguson

Tustice John Marshall Harlan was the only **J** dissenter from the U.S. Supreme Court's infamous ruling in Plessy v. Ferguson, in 1896, in which the majority

invoked the "separate but equal" test to uphold segregation laws.

Justice Harlan's immortal dissent became law in the landmark case of Brown v. Board. Of Education of Topeka, Kansas (1954).

in which the Court overturned Plessy and held that "separate but equal" was inherently unconstitutional and a violation of the 14th Amendment's Equal Protection Clause.

Harlan's dissent in Plessy, combined with his landmark dissent in The Civil Rights Cases of 1883, establish him as "the great dissenter" in American constitutional history. His dissent in The Civil Rights Cases, in which the Court had struck down an 1875 congressional statute that would have banned racial discrimination in all places of public accommodation, laid the foundation for Supreme Court rulings in the 1960s that prohibited private acts of discrimination. His opinion in Plessy provided the architecture for the Court's ruling in Brown, which remains our nation's most famous civil rights case. His lofty status

reflects that imperishable contribution, of course, as well as his enduring observations about fundamental constitutional principles and provisions.

> Justice Harlan's dissent in Plessy reiterated the important 13th Amendment argument that he had made in The Civil Rights Cases of 1883, in which he said that that amendment did more than abolish formal slavery and involuntary servitude. It also

prohibited the "badges and incidents" of slavery. The 13th Amendment, he wrote, "decreed universal civil freedom in the country."

In Plessy, Harlan confronted the Court with its own ruling in Strauder v. West Virginia (1880), where it had interpreted the 14th Amendment to mean that "the law in the States shall be the same for the black as for the white" and that the amendment embodied a "necessary implication" that blacks enjoyed "exemption from legal discriminations, implying inferiority in civil society, lessening the security of their enjoyment of rights

which others enjoy." The segregation act in Louisiana that separated blacks from whites on railroad cars, Justice Harlan stated, was unreasonable because segregation was not germane to a legitimate legislative end. The 14th Amendment, he

asserted, prohibited the state from creating legal distinctions based on color, such as those that involved public transportation, which included railroads. In words that resonate across the decades and inspire repetition, Harlan stated: "Our Constitution is color-blind, and neither knows nor tolerates classes among citizens."

Justice Harlan's outrage in Plessy was on full display. He believed that the Court's ruling in Plessy would be viewed as pernicious as Dred Scott v. Sandford (1857), in which the Court held that Black Americans could never be citizens of the United States. In his opinion for the Court in Dred Scott, Chief Justice Roger Taney spoke of blacks as "a subordinate and inferior class of beings," upon whom had been impressed "deep and enduring marks of

inferiority and degradation." Harlan took the Plessy Court to task for embracing separate but equal as a doctrine purporting to satisfy the 14th Amendment's guarantee of the equal protection of the law. The "thin disguise" of equality, he wrote, would mislead no one, "nor atone for the wrong done this day." Harlan's frustration with his colleagues was palpable. In the Civil Rights Cases, the Court prevented Congress from abolishing segregation. In Plessy, the Court supported segregation.

Justice Harlan's landmark

dissents are made more remarkable by his public, mid-life repudiation of the world of slavery. Born into a Kentucky slave-holding family he, himself, owned slaves and opposed the 13th Amendment. However, his growing belief that the Reconstruction Amendments and increased federal power were indispensable to America's future aided his intellectual and political transition from a defender of slavery to a powerful and eloquent advocate for the civil rights of Black Americans.

Following his death in 1911, Justice Harlan was regarded by most scholars and jurists as a middling Justice, largely because his views on the nature of the **Reconstruction Amendments** were out-of-step in a nation that practiced segregation. His reputation, however, dramatically changed in the 1950s, as a result of two events in 1954 — the Court's adoption of his famous dissent in Brown v. Bd. Of Education and President's Dwight D. Eisenhower's nomination of his distinguished grandson and namesake to the High Tribunal.

The subsequent scholarly reevaluation of Justice Harlan's career paid considerable respect to his stature as a great dissenter, who had foreshadowed fundamental developments in American constitutional law. It was Harlan who had suggested

that the 14th Amendment was designed to incorporate the Bill of Rights so that they would apply to the states. It was Harlan who had vigorously argued the harms and evils of the inherent inequality of racial segregation. And it was Harlan who argued that the plenary power of Congress under the Commerce Clause could be used to outlaw racial discrimination in public accommodations. There are many lessons to be learned from Justice Harlan's life and career, not the least of which is the reminder of the value of open-mindedness and a willingness to reevaluate issues in light of new facts and changing societal circum-

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

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Quest for the perfect chocolate chip cookie

The perfect cookie is solely based on individual preference. No cookie is judged more closely and regularly than the chocolate chip. Everyone's perfect chocolate chip cookie is different. Some folks are crisp cookie fans, and others are soft cookie fans.

In general, all chocolate chip cookie recipes are the same. They usually include flour, eggs, butter or oil, sugar, a leavening

agent, and chocolate. However, the ratio of ingredients and the type of ingredients used can change the result of a chocolate chip cookie. Learn chocolate chip cookie science so you can create your perfect cookie! Using just a few alterations, you can turn a basic chocolate chip cookie recipe into your favorite kind of cookie!

1. Thicker

Use less butter relative to flour. If you do not reduce the butter,

adding more flour to chocolate chip cookie dough will create a stiffer dough that spreads less in the oven. The cookie will be denser with a chewy middle.

Consider using cake flour instead of allpurpose flour for a softer, thick cookie.

Replace one teaspoon of baking soda with 2 to 3 teaspoons of baking powder. Replacing the baking soda with baking powder creates a soft, cake-like cookie.

2. Thinner

Increase the amount of liquid (add milk) to make the cookies spread more.

Reduce the amount of moisture-holding ingredients, like flour.

Using only white sugar produces a thin, crunchy cookie.

3. Crispier

Reduce the amount of moisture-holding ingredients, like flour. Lower moisture means crispier cookies. Fat (butter) also drives out moisture. When you reduce flour, the fat in the cookie dough will increase.

Use melted butter in the cookie dough to help create a cookie that spreads.

Bake the cookies for a longer time at a lower temperature so they will have the

Firm the dough to prevent it from spreading too much while baking. To firm the dough, chill the cookie dough for at least 30 minutes.

Make bigger cookies and bake them at

a higher temperature for less time. Take them out of the oven once the edges have browned, but the centers are still pale.

5. More flavorful

Cook (brown) the butter. Let it cool until solid before creaming with sugar.

Include vanilla and salt. In a recipe that uses 2 1/4 cups of flour, add 1 1/2 — 2 teaspoons of vanilla and 3/4 — 1

teaspoon of salt.

Use hand-chopped chunks, not chips. Sprinkle dough balls with flaky salt before baking.

The following cookie tips guarantee better cookies with every batch you bake. Line a cookie sheet with a non-stick silicone mat or parchment paper.

Use room temperature ingredients unless otherwise noted in the recipe. This includes eggs, butter, and other dairy products.

Be sure the ingredients are fresh and of the finest quality. Inexpensive butter can contain up to 19 percent water, making it harder for the eggs and butter to emulsify and contribute to excess spreading.

Softened butter should be soft but still slightly cool to the touch. When you press it, your finger will make an indent. However, your finger will not sink into the butter nor slide.

Using an electric mixer, beat the sugar and butter until it is light and fluffy (3 to 5 minutes). The mixture should not be grainy when you rub it between your fingertips.

Correctly measure the ingredients. Fluff or sift the flour. Spoon and level the flour or, better yet, weigh it. Measure liquids in a clear measuring cup. Pack the brown sugar.

Bake with large eggs. Adding eggs one at a time helps ensure that the eggs mix with the butter to emulsify the fat.

When adding in dry ingredients, be sure to mix until just combined. Do not over mix the cookie dough, or the cookies will be tough!

Folding cookie add-ins by hand reduces the chance of over-mixing the dough. Reserve some add-ins and press them onto the outside of the cookie dough before baking.

If a recipe calls for chilling the cookie dough, do not skip this step! Chilling cookie dough hardens the fat, enhances flavor, and decreases overspreading.

A cookie scoop portions the dough in a uniform shape and size to ensure the cookies will evenly bake. Always leave at least two inches between each dough ball to allow them room to spread.

One way to ensure cookies always turn out perfectly baked is to set a timer for two minutes less than the recipe states. Keep an eye on the cookies to avoid over baking.

Let the baking sheets cool to room temperature when baking cookies in batches. To cool a baking sheet quickly, run cool water over the bottom of the pan to cool it while keeping the top dry.

Once you pull the cookies out of the oven, let them set on the cookie sheet for 2 to 5 minutes. This allows them cool enough so that they will not break when you slide them onto a spatula to move to a cooling rack.

Cooling racks prevent cookies from getting soggy by allowing air to circulate evenly on all sides of the cookies.

You can make your cookies the way you like them by doing a few things differently. Now is the perfect time to start making cookies with confidence!

Attorney, land owner spar

The status of Cheyenne River Road has been a bone of contention for many years, but Weston County Attorney Michael Stulken has determined it to be a county road, as indicated in a letter dated June 8. The letter was a response to a concern from local resident Diane (Simon) Harris, who owns property on Cheyenne River Road, and has been concerned about an increase in truck traffic there since a bridge on a nearby road burned down two years ago.

The pertaining sections of the road include Cheyenne River Road No. 54, T41N R61W, Sec. 13, 14, 18, 19, 22 and 23, and Stulken stated that the Weston County Commissioners Record Book No. 3, Page 196, explains the establishment process of this road on Dec. 30, 1914, known as the Sheep Creek Divide Road.

According to those records, dated Jan. 4, 1915, the road "is a practicable route and should be allowed ... (T)he said road is hereby declared to be a county road." The county surveyor was instructed to survey and plat the area.

"Further, Weston County surveyed Cheyenne River Road No. 54 in 2014, with the portions of the road included in which cross your (Harris') land," Stulken said in the letter. "The recorded survey can be found at the Weston County Clerk's office, Plat Cabinet No. 2, Sleeves 82 and 83."

The minutes from the Oct. 16, 2018, Weston County commissioners meeting state that the 2013 board of commissioners authorized a survey, which Stulken said was completed in 2014, but "it was not signed or recorded." Commissioner Ed Wagoner moved to authorize the signatures a few years later at the 2018 meeting. Additionally, then-County Attorney William Curley declared it a county road, according to the minutes.

"When we reviewed it, we went right to the courthouse, and it was signed and dated," Stulken said.

However, Harris said that it is "fraudulent" for Stulken to declare it a county road because there was no original record or signing of the survey. She added that the minutes from the county commissioners' meeting in 1914 stated that a survey was going to be taken of the road, but there were no further records of the survey being taken.

"My attorney (Tad Daly from Gillette) says that there is nothing mentioned in it," Harris

said. "All I can tell you is that we've had the title searched numerous times. ... No one has been able to find an easement on the road."

Stulken said he was not sure what Harris was referring to when she mentioned an easement and reiterated that his research determined it to be a declared county road.

"I know they (the county) didn't have the easement back in 2012. One of the commissioners, Randy Rossman, came and knocked on my door wanting to know what it would take to get an easement," Harris said, adding that she was not interested in giving an easement at the time.

The dispute intensified for Harris when the Halliburton company wanted to start mining bentonite on nearby property owned by the Bureau of Land Management. Access to the mine was reached via the bridge on old Highway 85, which she said Halliburton had an easement for, until the bridge burned down in 2020. Weston County Road and Bridge Superintendent Jim Hansen said that Cheyenne River Road is "the only county road access in Weston County for Halliburton without a crossing over Beaver Creek."

According to the Jan. 5, 2021 official minutes of the Weston County commissioners, then-Road and Bridge Superintendent Marty Habeck said Halliburton offered to reconstruct the bridge to meet Wyoming Department of Transportation specifications. Then-County Attorney Alex Berger stated that a legal arrangement between Halliburton and the county was needed.

"It would be much more advantageous to the county to fix the bridge rather than build 5 miles of road," Harris said, describing the road in question as a "two-track dirt road" that goes through her pasture.

As a cattle owner, Harris said, declaring this road to be a county road makes her livestock more vulnerable to cattle theft. Additionally, there have been issues in the past, she said, with teenagers partying and leaving trash.

"Would you like someone coming through your property? That's my contention," Harris said. "It opens it up for a lot of problems."

However, both Stulken and Ertman stated that in their research they found this road to clearly be a county road.

"Our research indicated the current status of the road, and that's what it (the decision) is based on," Stulken said. "It is what it is."

Halliburton did not respond to emails from the News Letter Journal.

open a new one upon recommendation of the bank. "I would feel safer. It is going to be a lot of work to change it," Mayor Pam Gualtieri said.

Haggerty noted that various grants are deposited into the stricken account. She said that it will be a process of working with the bank to get everything switched over.

"Did they give any advice to prevent this in the future?" Councilman Lance Miles asked.

According to Haggerty and Gualtieri, the banks did not offer any advice on how to avoid a recurrence.

Haggerty said that it is likely the individual had a visual representation of what the city checks looked like but missed a few key factors in making the copies — including two lines for signatures — a flaw that led to them being caught.

"We have checked the check stock, and there are none missing. The numbers they had on the checks were also similar to the ones we are using currently," Haggerty said. "They were about 200 off, but those checks are still wrapped in a plastic cover in a box."

She noted that the checks linked to the account will need to be disposed of. Haggerty said that she will work with the bank to guarantee that outstanding checks from that account will still be paid.

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

and 63 calls for the CSO with 570 YTD.
City Clerk/Treasurer Stacy Haggerty reported that she had been notified about possible fraudulent activity on the City of Newcastle checking account. Fraudulent checks totaling the amount of \$12,046.01 had gone through the account. She stated that the bank had indicated that all the funds should be recouped but they recommend that the current account be closed and a new one opened. Ann McColley moved, seconded Don Steveson to close the current bank account and open a new one. MOTION CARRIED.


